[There are 10 points available for this task, which will be given for the best result. Other points will be given as deciles, like 9 points for the best 10%, 8 for the next 10% and so on.]

Every individual solutions is different.

Reading through postcolonial lens, what is the message of the song?

- a) Fela encourages Africans to use 'the face bleaching', a method could help prevent new infections from the deadly yellow fever. He also expresses anger towards previous colonisers who did not promote this method, indirectly killing many Africans.
- b) The song warns about the high number of deaths associated with yellow fever. It openly criticises the corrupt government for not dealing with the problem and encourages them take immediate action in order to tackle the disease.
- c) **By associating the 'bleaching' of faces (a method used for getting lighter skin colour – usually resulting in yellowish faces) with the infectious disease 'yellow fever', he rejects that African are culturally forced to borrow from the perceivably 'superior' Western culture and have to try to conform to Western standards of beauty at all price.**

Reading through postcolonial lens, what is the message of the song?

- a) **Fela argues that at the end of formal education, the state becomes the teacher of citizens. He argues that the state's role as a teacher is based on the country's respective culture and traditions which determine how to rule the citizens. It works like this in many countries such as in England, Italy, Russia or Vietnam, except in Africa which is a big problem for Africans. He also criticises African governments for the problems of inflation, poverty, mismanagement and electoral fraud, reflecting on post-colonial problems in African states.**
- b) Fela blames teachers for not being able to solve the country's educational problems. He regards it highly problematic that teachers do not teach students in a way which is up to Western standards. Due to the 'nativism' of the school curriculum, focused on learning tribal knowledge, rather than 'modern' knowledge, the school system does not prepare children for life in the new, independent and modern state.
- c) Fela encourages the students to rebel against formal education, which – according to his opinion – has no sense, because not education, but practical skills will help children to become successful in Africa. He suggests that children need to leave school and learn from their older companions.

E. Music can also serve as a popular form of resistance against oppression. Innocent's popular song 'Ejectment notice' written in the local Krio language and English expresses frustration with the ruling party.

This song is an example of youth music playing a role in addressing political issues hindering the development of young people after an 11-year-long civil war. Before the 2007 elections, in this African country music was integral to initiating a political conversation about the future of young people in the nation after several years of conflict. Therefore, it shows how music can play a role in getting a better understanding of conflicts as Geographers in postcolonial states.

4. Sport Cities of the United States

In this task....

- A.** In the United States of America, the universities have a big role in resupplying the player base. The universities commonly attract players with scholarships to join their sport programs. The searched player's university is located in the most populated state that does not have a team at all in the four major leagues.

This state is: **Virginia**

- B.** The teams are making big efforts to reach the fanbases outside the US. One of its main tools is that the big leagues hold some matches in cities like London, Stockholm or Shanghai. Our player's professional career started in a city that is located very close to the country border, and because of this, one the city's team played some of their home games between 2008 and 2013 on the other side of the border.

This city is: **Buffalo**

- C.** Besides the major leagues, car racing is a traditionally popular American sport too. The races of the NASCAR generate approximately 100 million dollars to local economies. The unknown player competed in the state, which could be called the home of the NASCAR: most of the teams are located here, and the Hall of Fame is here too. He stepped on home turf in a stadium that was named after a sponsor, whose headquarter is in the same city and it is a dominant factor in the tertiary sector.

This city is: **Charlotte**

- D.** The federal administration of the United States recognises 388 metropolitan statistical areas. These are units, that unify the urban core areas and its surrounding agglomerated zones. These statistical units are valid to the sports teams spatial localization too. As a combined San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward metropolitan area exists, regarding this system, the San Francisco 49ers and the Golden State Warriors (despite it is a team from Oakland) are in the same entity. Our player's next stop is in such a state, where teams in all of the four major leagues exists, but maximum three of them are located in the same metropolitan area. The player's exact city is famous for its Oktoberfest.

This city is: **Cincinnati**

- E.** There are more cities, where the citizens can support two teams in the same major league and because of this, a big rivalry is present. It is possible too, that these two teams share the same stadium/arena. Now we are looking for such a city, as the player's next home, but it is unique because the mutual home is not located in the state of the city.

This city is: **New York**

- F. Success plays a big role in the judgment of the American sports cities. We can find cities, that never, in any of the major leagues could get near the finals. The searched player's next city is far from this, the city's teams have won the championship in every four major leagues since 2000.

This city is: **Boston**

- G. In the first city, two of the major clubs' name was inspired by sea animals.

This city is: **Miami**

The origin of one of the second city's team name is credited to a masterwork of the American poetry.

This city is: **Baltimore**

- H. Nine of the ten most viewed American tv-events are Super Bowls, the finals of the National Football League. On that day the life stops in the United States, people take their break on the next Monday. This event is highly profitable for the tv companies (in 2017 the price of a 30 seconds advertisement was 5.5 million dollars), and the city, where the final is held (they change it every year) could calculate with a boom in tourism. The next city in our player's career is organized such an event, which is famous for two numbers: 3 and 28.

This city is: **Houston**

- I. The natural disasters sadly negatively affect sport events too. In September the Miami Dolphins – Tampa Bay Buccaneers football game could not be played, because of the Hurricane Irma. After that, in the next rounds, the players of the Floridian teams appeared with "One Florida" stickers on their helmets, supporting the disaster mitigation efforts. J. J. Watt, the star player of the Houston Texans, raised more than 37 million dollars for the casualties of the Hurricane Harvey. Our player played in such a city, that suffered a similar catastrophe. Because of the destruction of a hurricane, one of the city's team had to play their home games for two years 1000 kilometers afar.

This city is: **New Orleans**

- J. Because of the franchise system, technically none of the cities can consider their teams as their own, although it may happen that one team packs up during a night and moves to the other city (for example the Colts relocated in 1984 from Baltimore to Indianapolis). It is highly problematic in cities, where the teams are not successful, the viewership is low and tensions appear between the team owner and the mayor of the city, about the financing of a new stadium. The last team of our player is located in such a city, that was negatively affected by departure, and not even once. So today, this city is the capital of the most populous state, which does not have teams in every one of the four major leagues.

This city is: **Atlanta**

V. How human activity could influence the development of this type of mouth?

River deltas are threatened by rising sea level, primarily because of the regulation of the rivers. Building dams on the upper sections reduce the amount of transported sediments at the lower section of the river. Without sediments, the balance of accumulation (by the river) and erosion (by the sea) changes, and erosion will dominate the process.

D. While settled down in river valleys, human society has always been risked by floods. Sometimes, even a small and peaceful river could cause disaster and destroy the built environment, or take human life.

I. Name at least four methods people can protect themselves from floods!

for example:

- **Proper river regulation by building dams and reservoirs.**
- **Avoid artificial surfaces in riverbed.**
- **Keeping the forest coverage of the drainage basin, especially in the hillsides and mountains, to reduce the speed of water flowing into the riverbed after a heavy rainfall.**
- **Build levees.**
- **Build flood control channels.**
- **Avoid building in hazardous area.**
- **Build temporary barriers if needed.**

In recent years, according to the media, catastrophic floods may occur more frequently than earlier.

II. If it is true, what kind of reasons could be behind this? Name at least three possible reasons!

Climate change: rainfalls became more heavy, early heat waves in spring could cause rapid melt of snow, the alluvial plains have been built up, deforestation of mountains, less vegetation and more artificial surfaces (roads, roofs) on hillsides.

Although mud could be removed from streets and even damaged houses could be rebuilt, there are long-lasting consequences of floods to this town's life.

III. Name two possible long-term effects.

The citizens are leaving, fall of property prices, increase of insurance costs, investors avoid the city.

IV. Finally, you have to name this place, which is might less easy, than in the earlier cases. We are in a small town, where...

- the river depicted above is a tributary (left side) of a river which is the only navigable waterway connects a landlocked European country to the sea.
- The town is located east of a city, which is still famous of its trade fairs rooted in the middle ages.
- The town - like some 30 other places - is associated with Martin Luther, who not only preached here several times, but his private life gives also an important connection.
- An important part of the town's built heritage was a baroque stone bridge with six bows, destroyed in the flood mentioned above. Later it was rebuilt and today it is a part of a bicycle route.
